#### Major General Alan Dohrmann Outgoing Adjutant General



Major General Alan S. Dohrmann assumed duties as Adjutant General for the North Dakota National Guard in December 2015. As Adjutant General, General Dohrmann commands more than 4,100 North Dakota Soldiers and Airmen and supervises approximately 1,325 full-time federal and state employees. He also serves as the Director of Emergency Services consisting of two divisions: the

Division of Homeland Security and the Division of State Radio Communications.

Prior to his current assignment, General Dohrmann served as the Deputy Adjutant General from November 2010 to December 2015. From 2009 to 2010, he was assigned as the Commanding General, Multinational Task Force East, Camp Bondsteel, Kosovo. General Dohrmann also served as the North Dakota National Guard Land Component Commander and as the North Dakota Army National Guard's Chief of Staff.

General Dohrmann was commissioned in 1983 through the Reserve Officers' Training Corps at Minnesota State University, Mankato. He served seven years on active duty as a Rifle, Anti-Tank, and Scout Platoon Leader and as Company Executive Officer from 1984 to 1990. Upon his return from active duty, General Dohrmann joined the North Dakota National Guard. He served in a variety of command and staff positions in both the engineer branch and Judge Advocate General Corps. General Dohrmann has served in two overseas deployments.

### Brigadier General Mitchell Johnson Incoming Adjutant General



Brigadier General Mitchell R. Johnson assumed duties as the North Dakota National Guard Chief of Staff-Air in April 2024. He serves as an advisor to the Adjutant General on strategic planning, programs and policy, and oversees Air National Guard Staff assigned to Joint Force Headquarters. General Johnson represents the North Dakota Air National Guard at the national level on committees

and provides liaison on National Guard Bureau policy issues as requested by the Adjutant General.

Prior to his current assignment, General Johnson served as 119th Wing Commander from March 2021 to January 2024 and as the Deputy Wing Commander from 2018-2021.

General Johnson was commissioned in May 1997 through the Reserve Officers' Training Corps at Michigan Tech. He was selected for an Air Force Institute of Technology Civilian Institution Program and earned his master's degree in 1998. From 1997 to 2009, during his 12 years on active duty, General Johnson served in multiple flying assignments for Air Mobility Command, Air Education Command, and Air Force Special Operations Command. He has also commanded at the group and squadron level, and flown tactical airlift, special operations attack and remotely piloted aircraft worldwide. He has more than 5, 500 flight hours, including more than 1,100 combat hours. General Johnson has served in six overseas deployments.

#### Hístory of the North Dakota Natíonal Guard



#### ND Army National Guard



The first unit of what became the North Dakota Army
National Guard was organized in Bismarck in 1883. The 1st
North Dakota Infantry Regiment, later renamed the 164th
Infantry Regiment, served in the Spanish American War/
Philippine Insurrection, where nine Soldiers earned the Medal of
Honor; World War I; World War II, with the distinction of being
the first US Army unit to offensively engage the enemy; and the
Korean Conflict. The infantry structure was converted to engineer
battalions in 1955, later adding quartermaster, military police,
aviation, medical, and air defense units that have been mobilized
for the Berlin Crisis, Desert Storm, Kosovo Peacekeeping, and the
Global War on Terror, as well as service on the southwest
border and national capitol region.



#### ND Air National Guard



The 119th Wing, North Dakota Air National Guard, known as the "Happy Hooligans", was federally recognized in Fargo in 1947. The unit was initially focused on air defense, flying fighter aircraft and serving on alert status for the defense of the US northern border for 50 years. Their F-16's responded to the attack on the Pentagon on 9-11-2001. In 2007, the Hooligans took on new 24/7 operational missions, including an intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance mission as well as flying the MQ-9 Reaper, a state-of-the-art remotely piloted aircraft capable of precision attack and reconnaissance. The 219th Security Forces Squadron, activated in 2007, specializes in protecting nuclear missile sites around Minot Air Force Base.
